

Arkansas' Forgotten History Documented in New Book

hile most people scurry past old, untouched places that may seem as though they have lost value, photographers Michael Schwartz, Eddy Sisson, Ginger Beck and James Kirkendall find these historic, forgotten buildings throughout the state of Arkansas to be their most cherished treasures.

I strongly believe that readers will respond well to this feature of the book as all of the co-authors bring something new to the table."
